
Chesapeake Bay Cycling Tour




Day 1 – Campground at Chippokes State Park


Day 2 – We stopped for a snack at The Cheese Shop in Colonial Williamsburg




Day 3 – Friday, May 7 (112.4 miles)











Day 3 – The sun is setting and we were still on the way to Westmoreland State Park. We cycled over 100 miles and had to set up camp in the dark. Tough day!

Cyclists aren't allowed on Harry W. Nice Memorial Bridge (301), so we cycled to Alexandria to cross the Potomac








Day 4 – We started the day with a short hike to see the Horse Head Cliffs in Westmoreland State Park on the Potomac. What a set of stairs to the beach!






Day 5 – We stopped for lunch at National Harbor after crossing into Maryland

<u>Lighthouse</u>. We were able to cycle inside the fort. We had a great view of the Potomac from the walls of the fort.





Day 6 – Roads in southern MD typically had wide shoulders.




Day 6 – We teased Sandy about this dangerous place to park her bike!

Day 6 – We received a personal tour of the lighthouse and museum




Day 6 – Our guide didn't think that all 8 of us could fit at the top of the lighthouse, but we managed!





Day 8 – We really enjoyed cycling through Annapolis.








Day 9 – The Verrazano Bridge to Assateague includes a separate bridge for cyclists.





Day 11 – Saturday, May 15 (85.7 miles)

End – Cherrystone Family Campground








