## **Southern Utah/Grand Canyon Tour**

- Wednesday, July 24 Saturday, August 3
- Plan to arrive in Page, AZ on Tuesday, July 23.
- Plan to leave Page, AZ on Sunday, August 4
- Trip starts and ends in Page, AZ. Page is a popular starting point for visiting Lake Powell, the northern rim of the Grand Canyon, and more. It has an airport, lots of hotels and restaurants, bike shop, and more.
- Day 1 will be just local (but amazing) rides near Page. This will give us a chance to check out bikes for a day after having them shipped. If anyone is pushed for time at the start of the trip, they could easily arrive on Day 1 to begin the main part of the trip on Day 2.
- The trip includes 676 miles with 40,332 ft of vertical climbs (compare this to the Blue Ridge Parkway/Skyline Drive which has 61,000 ft of climbing in about the same number of miles). Of course, there will be opportunities for bonus miles ©
- The tour was modeled somewhat after a commercial tour (see link below). This tour started with cyclists being shuttled (cheaters!) from St. George, UT to Cedar Breaks (the highest point on the tour). #### **Temperatures**

- High and low average temperatures are almost directly related to elevation.
- Since elevations on the trip run from 3744 ft to 10600 ft, we will have a wide range of temperatures (Average low of 42 to average high of 104)








#### **Lower Antelope Canyon**

Departure time: \*7:00, 8:00, 9:30, 11:30 AM, 1:30 & \*3:30, \*4:30 PM

Adults: \$35.00 (Except \$46 at 11:30am)

Trips are approximately 1-1/2 hours long and you will travel in comfort in a 4-wheel drive vehicle to the Canyon entrance. From there, you walk into the Canyon, you will be at the bottom of the Canyon looking up 130 feet to the top. There is no hiking or climbing involved, only easy walking on the Canyon floor which is level for the most part. You will have up to 50

minutes to explore, photograph or enjoy the beauty. Then, you will return to the vehicle and return to Page.

<u>Note:</u> Antelope Canyon is operated by the Navajo Parks and Recreation department and visitors must be transported by a licensed operator.

Tour reservations are on a first come, first served basis; reservations may be made up to 24 hours in advance and must be reserved and paid for in person at Carl Hayden Visitor Center.




## Day 2 – Thursday, July 25 (76 miles, 3196 ft climbing)

Start: Page, AZ (4344 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 97/70 End: Kanab, UT (4909 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 93/58

Day 2 – We will cycle from Page, AZ across the bridge (700 ft over the Colorado River) in front of the nearby Glen Canyon Dam and begin our journey toward Kanab, UT. This should be one of the less eventful days of the trip, but should still be quite beautiful. Before long we will be immersed in spectacular canyons and national parks. I had originally planned to cut across the Grand Staircase – Escalante National Monument toward Bryce Canyon using Cottonwood Canyon Road. However, I was advised that this rough, 40-mile dirt





## Day 2 - Visiting the Toadstools (Hoodoos) and The Cockscomb





<u>Toadstools</u> - These are photos of the rock formations known as 'The Toadstools' in southern Utah. There are several clusters of these rock formations, most of which are easily accessible by trails just north of Highway 89, about halfway between Kanab, Utah and Page, Arizona. Coxcomb Ridge - These multicoloured, striped beds of rock form the north western part of Coxcomb ridge, and comprise rocks of the Lower Triassic, Moenkopi formation. They can be found near the Paria old movie set location off highway 89 from Kanab to Page, in southern Utah, which travels along the Vermillion Cliffs. The was the location used for several cowboy TV programs and movies, the last being 'The Outlaw Jose Wales', but time, the harsh desert environment, and flash floods eventually brought about the demise of the original buildings. -


<u>Rimrock Hoodoos</u>: Look for a small parking area on the north side of US 89 near milepost 20. Hike about a half mile on the marked trail to an area of tall hoodoos, toadstool rocks and redneck cliffs. These fascinating formations can be explored at any time of the day, but late afternoon sun is best for photography. This one of many scenic wonders in the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument.

## Day 3 – Friday, July 26 (78 miles, 5235 ft climbing)

Start: Kanab, UT (4909 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 93/58


End: Bryce Canyon North Campground, UT (7950 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 78/46

Day 3 – As we head northward toward Bryce Canyon, we will wind our way through a number of small towns, including Mt. Carmel Junction, Mt. Carmel, Orderville, Glendale, Alton, and Hatch. Hatch, at mile 51, has a few restaurants for lunch. With about 18 miles left, we will turn east on 12 (A Journey Through Time Highway) and will begin to enter the beautiful Red Canyon area. We will pick up a newly created 5-mile paved bicycle trail that parallels the highway as it gently climbs up through the canyon amongst red spires and hoodoos. As we crest Red Canyon, a flat ride through The Pines leads us into Bryce Canyon National Park.









## Days 3- 4: Bryce Canyon – Campground and other facilities

#### **Bryce Canyon Camping**

- Two campgrounds (North & Sunset) only \$15 for 3 tents/10 people per site. Only the **Sunset campground** takes reservations for tent sites (only 20 sites, so we need to make them early. Reservations can be made up to 6 months in advance, so we should make them on Jan 27)

- Canyon Lodge (Visitor Center)



## Day 4 - Bryce Canyon - Hiking the Navajo Trail

Bryce Canyon is filled with remarkable trails. One of the best known trails is the Navajo Trail (shown to the right). The Navajo Trail winds back and forth down sandstone slopes into the amphitheater and soon enters a narrow gorge called Wall Street which contains towering Douglas Fir trees reaching for the sun. The 1.3 mile trail starts and ends at Sunrise Point and drops 550 ft in elevation. The trail can be combined with the Queens Garden Trail for a total of 2.9 miles - start at Sunrise Point and end at

Sunset Point.



#### **NBH Tip**

Many people choose to hike the Navajo Loop Trail as a stand-alone trek, but by combining it with the Queen's Garden Trail you can experience more of the best scenery in Bryce Canyon National Park—just catch the Navajo Loop Trail at Sunset Point, and then exit the canyon via Sunrise Point.

We prefer to hike down the Navajo Loop Trail, through Wall Streetthe Wall Street section of the trail experienced a rock slide in the spring of 2006 that closed the trail, as of 2007 the trail is now open and takes visitors to Two Bridges, Thor's Hammer and Wall Street-and then on to the Queens' Garden. Climbing out of the canyon via the Queen's Garden Trail to Sunrise Point is a little less strenuous then climbing out along the Navajo Trail.

## Day 5 – Sunday, July 28 (60 miles, 4543 ft climbing)


Start: Bryce Canyon North Campground (7950 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 78/46

End: Cedar Breaks Point Supreme Campground (10332 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 70/42

We will exit Bryce Canyon the way entered, by taking the bike trail through Red Canyon. Our first 26 miles will be mostly downhill to the town of Panguitch where we will begin climbing towards the highest point on our trip, Cedar Breaks National Monument (10,600 ft). We will stop for lunch at Panguitch Lake at around 44 miles. This may be our last chance for food and supplies as Cedar Breaks is quite remote. Cedar Breaks is also likely to be cold. The campground is often snowed in until the beginning of June. Even in July the average low is only 42, keep your warm weather gear handy!







The nearest local store is located in Brian Head (eight miles north of the campground). Brian Head also has WiFi access and several small restaurants.

Camp sites are limited to eight people and limited to two camping units, such as two tents or a tent with a trailer. The campground fee is \$14 per night. Showers included, but no laundry.









## Day 5 – Cedar Breaks Amphitheater

Cedar Breaks Scenic Drive (148) - From Highway 14 turn onto Highway 148 to get to Cedar Breaks. Once there enjoy the five-mile scenic drive. This short road takes visitors to many of the monuments attractions including the four developed view points: *Spectra Point*, *Point Supreme*, *Chessmen Ridge* and *Sunset View*. Spectra Point displays the most detailed hoodoos. Point Supreme has perhaps the best view of the Bryce Canyon amphitheater. At Chessman Ridge the hoodoos look like giant chess pieces and Sunset View is of course the best spot to watch the sun set.





## Day 6 – Monday, July 29 (73 miles, 3133 ft climbing, 8418 descending)

<u>Start</u>: Cedar Breaks Point Supreme Campground (10332 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 70/42 <u>End</u>: Zion National Park Watchman Campground (3744 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 99/68


The ride from Cedar Breaks should be fast and breathtaking with over 8400 ft of descents and gorgeous views. We might stop in Mt. Carmel Junction for lunch (about 23 miles before Zion). We should arrive early enough in the day to spend some of the afternoon exploring Zion National Park. When we get close to Zion National Park's East Entrance the road has several switchbacks as well as two tunnels. One is very short, but the Zion-Mt. Carmel tunnel is 1.1 miles in length and requires an escort for oversize vehicles, campers, etc. Additionally, bicycles are not allowed through the tunnel (but see note below).

<u>Zion-Mt. Carmel Tunnel</u> - Riding through the Zion-Mt. Carmel Tunnel is prohibited; bicycles must be transported through the tunnel by motor vehicle. Usually the ranger (escort) at the tunnel will ask those driving a truck if bikers can hop in the back of their trucks. - <a href="http://wikitravel.org/en/Zion National Park">http://wikitravel.org/en/Zion National Park</a>

## Day 6 – Gravel road option?


I originally thought that we might be able to use North Fork Rd (36 miles long) to connect Hwy 14 out of Cedar Breaks to Hwy 9 just before Zion Park. This would cut 10.5 miles off of our trip (62.5 miles instead of 73). However, North Fork Road is a "well-maintained gravel road" and will probably be slower, especially since we should be flying on the roads with 8000 ft of descents. The North Fork Road also does not have as smooth an elevation profile as seen below. Of course, we can ask about the road when in Cedar Breaks and perhaps some will want to try it (a quiet road away from the traffic has some appeal). We will also cycle right past it, so we can have a look when we go by.




- Canyon Junction Court of the Patriarchs

- There are two campgrounds at Zion: The South Campground and Watchman.
- Reservations for campsites at <u>Watchman Campground</u> for camping from March 3, 2012 through November 25, 2012 may be made six months prior to your arrival date online at <u>www.recreation.gov</u> or by calling 877-444-6777.
- There are 9 Tent Only, Walk-to campsites. These sites are a short walking distance from vehicle parking and are ideal for bicyclists.
- Tent Only campsites are \$16.00 per night.
- No showers. No laundry. 6 people per campsite, including children.
- Tent pads can accommodate 1 large, 2 medium or 3 small tents at most sites.
- Showers and laundry are available for a fee in Springdale.
- Bicycles are allowed only on the paved Pa'rus Trail and park roads.

Start: Zion National Park Watchman Campground (3744 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 99/68

End: Jacob Lake Inn or Campground, AZ (7920 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 79/51

We will once again have to be transported through the Zion-Mt. Carmel Tunnel as we exit Zion National Park to the east. We will continue through Carmel and will stop at Kanab, UT for lunch (31 miles). We will continue south on 89 and enter Arizona. We will pass through Fredonia and continue on to Jacob Lake. Jacob Lake has a lodge (with a restaurant and bakery), a visitor center, and a campground. You can stay in the lodge or the campground (I pick the lodge as the campground is primitive – more details on later slides). *This may be the hardest day of the trip with 78 miles and over*



We will head south along a beautiful stretch from Jacob Lake toward the northern rim of the Grand Canyon. The road winds through 100-foot-high ponderosa pines, white-barked quaking aspen and small grassy meadows border the highway. 





#### **Days 8-9 – Hiking near the North Rim**


Bright Angel Point, south from the visitor center, can be reached via a 1-mile round trip hike with a grand view of the canyon. The Transept Trail offers an easy 3-mile round trip hike. The Uncle Jim Trail offers a relatively easy 4-mile loop along the edges of Bright Angle and Roaring Springs canyons. It forks from the Ken Patrick Trail (which is suitable for advanced

hikers).



#### Days 8-9 - Biking/hiking near the North Rim

The Bridal Trail (1.2 mi) is the only trail that permits bikes. It connects the campground, General Store, Visitor Center, and Lodge, so we will probably use it quite a bit.



#### 1. Bright Angel Point Trail

0.5 mi./0.8 km round-trip;
30 minutes approximate round-trip
A short walk on a paved trail leads to a
spectacular view of the canyon. The trail
begins at the log shelter in the parking area
by the visitor center or at the corner of the
back porch behind the lodge. Obtain selfguiding nature trail pamphlets from a box
along the trail.

#### 2. Transept Trail

3.0 mi./4.8 km round-trip;
1.5 hours approximate round-trip
Trail follows the canyon rim from
Grand Canyon Lodge to the North Rim
Campground.

#### 3. Bridle Trail

This trail follows the road as it connects the Grand Canyon Lodge with the North Kaibab Trailhead, a distance of 1.2 miles/2 km one-way. Pets on leash and bicycles are permitted on this hardpacked trail.

#### 6. Uncle Jim Trail

5.0 mi./8.0 km round-trip; 3 hours approximate round-trip hiking time. Winds through the forest to a point overlooking the canyon and the North Kaibab Trail switchbacks. Begins at the North Kaibab Trail parking lot. This trail is also used by mules.

#### 4. North Kaibab Trail

Distance and hiking times vary.

This is the only maintained trail into the canyon from the North Rim. Distances and locations for North Kaibab trail, and information about canyon hiking are listed on pages 12-13. Under no circumstances should you attempt to hike from the rim to the river and back in one day! Round trip to the Colorado River is 28 miles/45 km and the trail descends almost 6,000 ft./1,800 m.

The opening of the North Kaibab Trail may be delayed due to severe winter damage. More information on the North Kaibab Trail is displayed on page 13. This trail is also used by mules.

#### 5. Ken Patrick Trail

10 mi./16 km one-way; 6 hours approximate one-way hiking time.

Trail winds through the forest and along the rim from Point Imperial to the North Kaibab Trail parking area.

#### 7. Widforss Trail

10 mi./16 km round-trip; 6 hours approximate round-trip hiking time Blends forest and canyon scenery. Even a short walk can be very satisfying. Take the dirt road 1/4 mile/0.4 km south of Cape Royal Road for 1 mile/1.6 km to the Widforss Trail parking area. Self-guiding trail brochure available at trailhead.

#### 8. Arizona Trail

A section of this trail enters the park near the North Entrance and roughly parallels the highway until it connects with the North Kaibab Trail, a distance of approximately 10 miles/16 km.

# Day 9 – Thursday, August 1 (56 miles, 5111 ft climbing) A day exploring the northern rim of the Grand Canyon

### **Exploring the northern rim of the Grand Canyon**

- We will camp at the Northern Rim Campground for two nights, so we can ride unloaded on Day 9
- In addition to numerous hiking trails, there are roads from the campground to Bright Angel Point, Point Imperial, and Cape Royal.
- Cycling from Bright Angel Point to Point Imperial to Cape Royal and back would be about 56 miles. We could also just cycle to Point Imperial and see if we feel like continuing to Cape Royal. Just going to Point Imperial and back would be around 24 miles.

<u>Jacob Lake to Lees Ferry</u> — We will continue on along the Vermillion Cliffs Wilderness area toward Lee's Ferry. We will stop at the *Lees Ferry Lodge* (also called the *Vermillion Cliffs Lodge*).


Although this days has 80 miles of cycling, the elevation

profile indicates a fairly easy ride with quite a bit of descent. We may stop by Cliff Dwellers Lodge (convenience store also here) about 6 miles before Lees Ferry Lodge.

I had originally planned to continue another 8.5 miles to the Lee's Ferry Campground, but the campground is primitive and the closest options for dinner and breakfast would be

Staying at the Lodge seems like a good choice given the likely high temperatures and the convenient restaurant. If anyone is up for bonus miles, we can drop off gear at the lodge and cycle 3.5 miles (one way) to the Navajo Bridge or 8.5 miles to the Lee's Ferry Campground. If not, we can see them in the morning on our way to Page.

cycling back to Lee's Ferry Lodge.



#### Day 10 – Jacob Lake to Lees Ferry

Cycling from Jacob Lake to Lee's Ferry – "The stretch of Highway 89A from Jacob Lake Inn to Marble Canyon, Navajo Bridge, and Lee's Ferry lets you experience dramatic changes in climate and altitude and some of the most beautiful scenery in the Southwest. Over this 45 mile stretch of US 89A you drop from the cool winds blowing through the Ponderosa pines of the Kaibab Plateau at 7,925 feet (2415.5 meters) in elevation, to the red rock desert at the foot of the Vermillion Cliffs Wilderness, to the chilling waters of the Colorado River (perfect for feet tired of pedaling) in Glen Canyon at Lee's Ferry at approximately 3100 feet (944.8 meters). While at Lee's Ferry you may see a group of rafters setting off for their adventures down the Grand Canyon. This ride is a wonderful way to pass a morning or afternoon in the beauty of the outdoors.

Bikers are advised to use proper safety equipment and precautions during a ride. Temperatures are often in excess of 100°F

(38°C) in summer months and riders are cautioned to bring plenty of water and to use sunscreen." -

## Highway 89A House Rock Valley Overlook:

This pullout provides an excellent view of House Rock Valley and a portion of the Vermilion Cliffs far in the distance.

As you continue west, 18 miles from Marble Canyon, you will pass the **San Bartolome Historic Site.** Pull into the parking area and read the plaques that tell the tale of the Escalante and Dominguez expedition -- one of the earliest undertaken by white men in this harsh and forbidding wilderness -- which traversed the river near this point in 1776.





#### **Vermilion Cliffs**

*Our last day!* We will cycle 3.5 miles to the Navajo Bridge and Visitor Center. The older bridge is now a pedestrian walkway which gives a great view of the Colorado River below. A recommended option will be to also cycle from the bridge down to the Lees Ferry Campground (5 miles with about 450 ft drop in elevation). This will give a rare opportunity to see the Colorado River (or even take a very cold dip). This is a common starting point for Grand Canyon rafting trips, so we may see some groups setting out on their adventures. After returning to the Navajo Bridge, we will continue past the Vermillion Cliffs and through Antelope Pass on our way back to Page. About 4 miles from the end of the trip, we might stop for one last look at the famous Horseshoe Bend in the Colorado River (1/2 mile hike from 89).








## **Day 11 - Map and Elevation Profile**

42/52 miles, 3027 ft climbing

- Start: Lees Ferry Lodge, AZ or Marble Canyon, AZ (3100 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 104/73
- End: Page, AZ (4344 ft) Avg Hi/Lo: 97/70

Marble Canyon is the section of the Colorado River canyon in northern Arizona from Lee's Ferry to the confluence with the Little Colorado River, which *marks the beginning of the Grand Canyon*. Lee's Ferry is a common launching point for river runners starting their journey through the Grand Canyon. Marble Canyon is also well known for the Navajo Bridge, where US Highway 89A crosses the Colorado River. Marble Canyon marks the western boundary of the Navajo Nation.





# Day 11 - Navajo Bridge/Interpretive Center at Marble Canyon

Navajo Bridge Interpretive Center, near Lees Ferry, daily mid-April - October, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; weekends only, early April and November, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Attractions: Bookstore, outdoor exhibits, and self guided walks across the historic Navajo Bridge. This is a popular spot to look for a California Condor.

#### Day 11 – Lee's Ferry

"Lees Ferry is the only place within Glen Canyon where visitors can drive to the Colorado River in over 700 miles of Canyon Country, right up to the first "rapid" in the Grand Canyon. Lees Ferry continues to be a center of modern activity. Here at the very start of the Grand Canyon, adventurous river runners launch their boats for trips down the canyon."

From the Navajo Bridge we can cycle 5 miles down Lees Ferry Road to the launch site (and the Lees Ferry Campground). This will be a rare chance to see the Colorado River and perhaps see some rafters launch. You might even want to take a dip, but it will be *cold*. The Glen Canyon Dam, only 14 miles upstream, keeps the water at a constant 47 degrees. It may only warm up a couple of degrees by the time the water reaches Lees Ferry.

#### Day 11 – Vermillion Cliffs and Antelope Pass

#### Day 11 – Navajo Scenic Overlook & Horseshoe Bend

Navajo Scenic Overlook: A short drive north along Highway 89 from Antelope Pass brings you to one of the more spectacular vistas in the southwest. From this pullout on the Navajo Reservation, you can try to take in the immense panorama of the Vermilion Cliffs, lower Paria Canyon, Echo Peaks, Lake Powell, Navajo Mountain, and much of the Kaiparowits Plateau within the new Grand Staircase-Escalante Canyons National Monument. Don't pass up this gem!

## Annual Pass versus individual park fees

- Cedar Breaks entry fee (weekly per person): \$4.00
- Zion National Park entry fee (weekly bicycle pass): \$12.00
- Bryce Canyon National Park entry fee: \$12.00
- Grand Canyon Northern Rim entry fee: \$12.00



The Interagency America the Beautiful pass is the new pass replacing the old National Park pass. Instead of getting only into National Parks across the United States, this new pass is valid at National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, Corps of Engineers, Fish and Wildlife Service, and Forest Service sites with admission fees. The Interagency pass admits the pass owner and any accompanying passengers in a private vehicle\* if a park has a per vehicle entrance fee. Where a per person entrance fee is charged, the Interagency Pass admits the pass owner, and three

adults.


The cost of the Interagency Pass is \$80.00 and is good for an entire year until the last day of the month of purchase.


