


<u>Day 1 – Saturday, May 9</u>

Virginia Beach to Chippokes Plantation State Park Campground - 67.8 miles (+ 12 bonus RT miles to Surry for dinner)







We will leave from Paul's house in Virginia Beach. We will cycle through parts of Virginia Beach, Chesapeake, Norfolk, and Portsmouth as we exit the Tidewater area, including several major river crossings. We will transition into quiet farmlands and will stop at historic Smithfield (MP47) for lunch. We will continue along rural roads until we reach Chippokes State Park where we will camp. The park includes scenic cliffs along the James River. After setting up camp, we can cook in camp or cycle an extra 10 miles (RT, unloaded) to Surry and back for dinner at Anna's Italian Restaurant (a local favorite).

<u>Chippokes Plantation State Park</u> is a combination of natural history, cultural history, and outdoor activities.

Situated on the James River, this beautiful park offers visitors a sprawling recreation site with a swimming pool, campgrounds, cabins, picnic areas, equestrian trails, James River beach access and visitors' center. Our farm museum, along with the original plantation, historic houses and farm buildings, lets you step back into time and offers a glimpse into the early history of Virginia.

One of the oldest continuously operated plantations in the nation,








<u>Day 2 – Sunday, May 10</u> <u>Chippokes Plantation State Park Campground</u> to <u>Merchants Millpond State Park</u> – 69.4 miles

We will cycle 7 miles into Surry for breakfast. The Citco at the corner of 10 and 31 (the only traffic light in Surry) serves quick breakfast items (breakfast sandwiches, biscuits, etc) from 5am – 10am. We will pass through Windsor, VA at about MP35 where we can stop for groceries at Food Lion (Subway and some other fast food restaurants also available). We will stop for dinner at Doris and Roger's Kitchen in Gates, NC (6am-8pm). This restaurant looks like an attractive house (see below).

Merchants Millpond State Park is an amazing park. If we arrive early a canoe trip is recommended, but watch out for the alligators! See the next slide for more information.

An "enchanted forest," primitive species of fish relatively unchanged over millions of years, towering bald cypress trees with massive trunks, luxuriant growths of Spanish moss - this is Merchants Millpond State Park. Here, coastal pond and southern swamp forest mingle, creating one of North Carolina's rarest ecological communities. Together with upland forests, these environments create a haven for wildlife and humanity alike.



Canoe Rental Fees

First Hour --- \$5/hour

Additional Hours --- \$3/hour



Canoeing: Rent a canoe or bring your own; the best way to explore Merchants Millpond is by gliding across the park's placid, shallow waters. A boat ramp and pier near the parking area offer access to the water. Marked canoe trails lead from the boat ramp to canoe campsites. Or, venture out of the millpond and take slow-moving, dark-water Bennetts Creek through Lassiter Swamp. Here, park visitors are transported into a world of mistletoe, hanging Spanish moss and ancient cypress trees.

Facility: Twenty drive-to campsites (non-electric). A picnic table and grill are at each campsite.

Location: Highway 158 entrance.

Accommodates: Up to six persons per site.

Nearby Amenities: Washhouse with drinking water, restrooms and showers.

Available: Year-round.

Reservations Required: Reservations are strongly advised. Any unreserved sites are available on a first-come, first-served basis.





Pettigrew State Park - 66.8 miles

A highlight of Day 3 will be visiting Edenton, NC, a charming small southern city with lots of history and architecture. We will arrive in Edenton at around mile 35 in the trip, and should have time to visit for a couple of hours and to eat lunch (and do laundry). There will be several choices of things to do. 

1767 Chowan County Courthouse*


The most intact Colonial courthouse in America, the structure has been restored and is now open for guided tours and community events. Joseph Hewes, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, was one of the commissioners appointed to raise money for its construction. Judges James Iredell and Samuel Johnston, prominent Revolutionary patriots, heard cases here. The Courthouse Green runs from the Courthouse to the Revolutionary War cannon fronting Edenton Bay, and is lined with historic private homes. Open Tues-Sat, 9AM - 3PM.




Lake Pettigrew State Park - Day 3



<u>Camping</u>: Family camping: The family campground is located between the park office and Somerset Place. Thirteen campsites, each with a picnic table and grill, are well-suited for tents and trailers. Water and restrooms with showers are nearby.

The edge of a cypress/sweetgum forest furnishes a shaded area for some of the campsites while others are located in an open, grassy meadow.

Group camping: The campground is surrounded by a forested area and has easy access to Lake Phelps via a 740-foot boardwalk trail. Primitive camping facilities include tent pads, a fire ring, vault toilet and potable water.




Alert: Visitors using GPS or Google Maps to reach Pettigrew State Park ... details ±
People using GPS and Google Maps are experiencing incorrect directions to Pettigrew State Park. Please do not rely on the directions given by GPS to get you to the park. It is not possible to get to the park office going down Holland Road. To get to the park office take Hwy 64 toward Creswell. Take exit 558 (Alligood Rd). Follow the signs approximately 8 miles to the park entrance. All roads leading to the main park entrance are paved. For more information call (252)797-4475

Biking: Enjoy biking through the beautiful scenery along the way to Somerset Place State Historic Site. Bikers can travel through the park to all of the points of interest and the many scenic overlooks.

For a leisurely ride, bike along the National Wildlife Refuge roads.

Day 4 – Tuesday, May 12

We will get an early start to make sure that we make the 1pm ferry from Swan Quarter to Ocracoke (at the 62.2 mile point). We could catch the 4:30 ferry as an emergency backup plan.

- 4:30 pm ferry Arrive in Ocracoke at 7:10 pm We will stop at a grocery to get lunch items to eat ____ on the ferry and enjoy the trip across the Pamlico Sound. When we arrive in Ocracoke, we can cycle

4 miles to camp, set up camp, and return for

dinner.





Day 4 – Ocracoke Campground

The campground is located 4 miles from Ocracoke Village. We can set up camp on Day 4 and then cycle to back Ocracoke for dinner. Day 5 will be a short day, so we can cycle to Ocracoke for a late breakfast.






Facilities:

Ocracoke Campground is only accessible by ferry or aircraft.

Campsites are located on sandy soil, so campers are encouraged to bring extra long tent stakes. Flush toilets, drinking water, cold showers and grills are all provided for a more comfortable beach camping experience.





Days 4-5 – Ocracoke Lighthouse and Visitor Center

The Ocracoke lighthouse is not open for climbing at any time. The Visitor Center will be open

9am-5pm.





Ocracoke Island Visitor Center


Near the Seashore's southern edge in Ocracoke Village is the *Ocracoke Island Visitor Center*, located at the end of N.C. Highway 12 where the road enters the ferry terminal. The visitor Center is a mix of Eastern National bookstore items and exhibits focused on Ocracoke history.

From the visitor center, the <u>Ocracoke Lighthouse</u> is visible across Silver Lake. The Ocracoke Island Visitor Center is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. year round (closed Christmas Day).

Day 5 – Wednesday, May 13 - **Ocracoke Campground to Frisco Campground –** 23.4 miles

This will be a short day so we can cycle to Ocracoke (4 mi) for leisurely breakfast (8am?) and then back to camp to pack up. We will cycle 9.6 miles to the ferry (it leaves on the half-hour). After departing from the ferry we can cycle 0.3 miles to the *Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum*



The *Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum* is a public, non-profit, educational institution. The Museum is dedicated to the preservation, advancement and presentation of the maritime history and shipwrecks of the North Carolina Outer Banks from the earliest periods of exploration and/or colonization to the present day, with particular emphasis in the periods from 1524 to 1945. The Museum preserves, researches, exhibits and interprets its collections for the benefit of the general public and specialized audiences.

The Museum serves its diverse audiences in order to inspire appreciation, encourage discovery, and promote and an active, responsible understanding of the maritime heritage of the Outer Banks itself and in relation to that of the United States and the broader history of seafaring.

The Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum is located in Hatteras Village, the southern most community on Hatteras Island. Access to the Museum is from Highway 12 *near the NC DOT ferry terminal* on Coast Guard Road.

The design of the Museum building is unique. The Entrance Court is reminiscent of the timbers of the many shipwrecks that once were so common along the treacherous Hatteras coast.

Day 5 – Hatteras Lighthouse and Visitor Center

Lighthouse Climbing: 9:00 – 4:30.

Visitor Center: 9:00 – 5:00.

Climbing the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse

Climbing the historic Cape Hatteras Lighthouse is a unique experience. The climb is self-paced and provides views from the tallest brick lighthouse in North America.

The Cape Hatteras Lighthouse is open from the third Friday in April through Columbus Day. Climbing hours are 9 am to 4:30 pm daily in the spring and fall, and 9 am to 5:30 pm the Friday of Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. Tickets are required.

Tickets

Climbing tickets are \$8 for adults and \$4 for senior citizens (62 or older), children (11 and under, and at least 42" tall), and the disabled. Tickets are available on a first come, first served basis and can only be purchased in-person at the site the day of the climb. There are no advance ticket sales for regular climbs.

Ticket sales begin at 8:15 am and climbs begin at 9 am, running every 10 minutes with a limit of 30 visitors per climb. Ticket sales close at 4:30 pm in the spring and fall, and 5:30 pm the Friday of Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. Ticket holders should arrive at the base of the lighthouse five minutes prior to their ticketed climb time.

Note: The Hatteras Lighthouse and the Visitor Center will be open, but the *Museum of the Sea* will not open until the Friday before Memorial Day.



<u>Day 6 – Thursday, May 14</u> Frisco Campground to **Adventure Bound Campground** (Kitty Hawk) – 72.6 miles

We will cycle 6.1 miles to breakfast in Buxton and then begin a long trek northward along the Outer Banks (hopefully with a tailwind this year)! We can stop for lunch near Waves or Rodanthe (MP30) or else wait until Sam and Omie's Restaurant at around MP57 (most likely choice). We may briefly visit the small Pea Island Visitor Center and will probably stop and climb the Bodie Island Light House (we just missed it last year). We will have an exhilarating ride on the 2.5-mile Bonner Bridge (shown below)) over Oregon Inlet and will have wonderful views of the Atlantic Ocean and the Pamlico Sound. The bridge has a small shoulder. There are many restaurants





Day 6 – Thursday, May 14







Restaurant originally opened on the Outer Banks by a couple of fishermen as a pre-fishing breakfast stop, *Sam & Omie's Restaurant* in Nags Head maintains its seaside flavor more than 70 years later. The place exudes a barefoot and "beachy" atmosphere and serves up plenty of tasty dishes morning, noon and night, including omelets, hamburgers, club sandwiches and prime rib or seafood dinners.

Day 6 – Thursday, May 14 - Bodie Island Lighthouse

Climbing the Bodie Island Lighthouse

At Bodie Island, you have the chance to climb the lighthouse at your own pace and take in the gorgeous natural surroundings of Bodie Island, the Atlantic Ocean, and Pamlico Sound.

The Bodie Island Lighthouse is open from the third Friday in April through Columbus Day (in early October). Climbing hours are 9 am to 4:30 pm daily. Tickets are required.

Tickets

Climbing tickets are \$8 for adults and \$4 for senior citizens (62 or older), children 11 years of age and under, and the disabled. Climb tickets are available on a first come, first served basis and can only be purchased in-person at the site the day of the climb. There are no advance ticket sales for regular climbs.


Ticket sales begin at 8:45 am and climbs begin at 9 am, running every 15 minutes with a limit of 12 visitors per climb. Ticket sales close at 4:25 pm. Ticket holders should arrive at the base of the lighthouse five minutes prior to their ticketed climb time.





Day 6 - Wright Brothers Memorial

We can stop at the Memorial on the way to camp. Cycling around the Memorial is great fun and gives an impressive view of the area. If time allows, the small museum is open from 9-5 (\$4.00).



<u>Day 7 – Friday, May 15</u> <u>Adventure Bound Campground</u> (Kitty Hawk) to Virginia Beach – 84.3 miles

We will eat breakfast at a nearby McDonald's in Kitty Hawk before heading across the Wright Memorial Bridge. We will pack a lunch or stop at another McDonald's just before the Currituck - Knotts Island Ferry (11am or 1pm). The ferry is popular with cyclists and is part of our local bike club's Knott's Island Century. Look for osprey and other birds nesting on the channel markers along the ferry route.
